The result of this effort will be a plan that offers specific recommendations to the NADBank Board of Directors regarding Bank and BECC policies and programs for serving the border region.

- 15. NADBank is financing 97 comprehensive border infrastructure projects, providing \$840 million in financing. These projects represent \$2.5 billion in total investment, indicating that NADBank has effectively leveraged its funding. These projects are benefiting over 11 million people in the border region through:
 - -56 new water and wastewater treatment plants
 - -9 new landfills
 - -64 water and sewer systems
 - -9 street paving projects for more than 9.1 million square meters of paved streets While this is significant process, staggering needs remain in basic water, wastewater and solid waste infrastructure.
