Reconciliation

The Texas Election Code now requires that the presiding judge of the central counting station attest to a written reconciliation of votes and voters (127.131f):

- At the close of tabulation on election day
- Again after counting late mail/provisional ballots (canvass)
- For primaries conducted jointly, you may either combine parties or have a form for each
- Post completed forms on your county website
- Only applies to counties with central counting stations



Reconciliation

Compares the number of voters who cast valid ballots with the number of votes counted by your tabulation system



- Box E minus Box H gives you the number of voters who cast valid ballots
- Then subtract box M to compare the number of valid ballots to the number of ballots counted

N. Difference between voters and ballots (E-H-M)



- Calculate the percentage to put the discrepancy into context
- Start with inner parentheses (Box E box H)
- Divide Box N by that number
- Multiply by 100

 Difference as percentage of voters (N÷(E-H)*100)

- Explain the difference between voters and votes
 - Clearly distinguish between what you know happened vs. what you think probably happened
 - \odot Attach explanation if you need more space



- Tracking down discrepancies
 - Look at each row to find which category a discrepancy is in
 - Compare votes and voters for each polling location
 - Think about how the parts of your voting system work together
